About the report

Business travel can be a barometer for economic growth. The rise and fall of business travel volumes reflect the level and health of economic activity within a region or country. BCD's *Cities & Trends 2023 Asia Pacific edition* shows the top destinations for APAC business travelers with insights into how they travel. The findings are based on BCD flight and rail data from 2023 in a range of APAC markets.* This APAC edition follows the recently published 2023 <u>Europe edition</u> and <u>U.S. edition</u>. The reports are produced annually.

Top 10 APAC cities

Singapore is clearly leading the way in APAC, reclaiming its status as a major meetings, incentives, conferences and exhibitions destination post pandemic. Robust government support, with S\$870 million (US\$664 million) OneAviation Support Package for the aviation sector in 2021 and more than S\$300 million (US\$223 million)¹ has helped its tourism sector continue its post-pandemic recovery amid intensifying global competition in 2024.2 It has maintained its position as the primary financial hub in the region ahead of Hong Kong and now ranks as Asia's top financial center and the third globally.3 In 2023, Changi Airport recovered to about 86%4 of its pre-pandemic passenger volume, driven by a strong rebound in Northeast and Southeast Asia traffic, making Singapore an accessible and convenient destination for business.

Top 5 countries

According to BCD flight transactions, Singapore was the most visited APAC country last year, followed by China. The recovery of international travel to and from China has lagged behind the rebound in the country's domestic travel industry following the end of its zero-COVID policy. Domestic air travel is at 17% above 2019 levels, while international air travel is still recovering.* Factors such as a shortage of flights, high ticket prices, and administrative hurdles in obtaining visas have contributed to this slower recovery.

The United States is the most visited country globally, followed by Germany. This is not surprising because four American cities were among the top 10 intercontinental cities.

Top 10 routes

According to BCD flight data, the most frequently traveled routes* for APAC flights primarily depart from Singapore, which accounts for four positions in the top 10 city pairs. Hong Kong follows with two city pairs in the top 10.

The top 10 arrival hubs for APAC routes are predominantly in Southeast Asia and North Asia, with Singapore being the most popular destination.

For intercontinental city pairs, Bangalore to Frankfurt tops the chart. The most frequently traveled routes for intercontinental flights from APAC mainly depart from Tokyo and Singapore, together holding seven positions in the top 10 routes.

The top 10 arrival hubs for intercontinental routes are largely dominated by European cities, with Frankfurt being the most popular.

Top 5 layover cities

Due to flight times, costs or the lack of direct flights, it's common for travelers to make one* or more stopovers especially for intercontinental journeys.

Thanks to its location and excellent connectivity, Singapore is unsurprisingly the top city for layovers on APAC flights.

For intercontinental flights from APAC, the Middle East leads the way, with Dubai and Doha ranking as the first and third most popular layover cities.



Cabin class and flight type

For APAC flights, most travelers booked economy and only 17% booked business class. For intercontinental flights, the figures shift significantly, with 49% booking business class and 44% booking economy.

Comparatively, in the U.S., business class and economy class account for 53% and 36% of intercontinental flights, respectively. In Europe, 47% of travelers booked business class, and 42% booked economy for intercontinental flights.

Most APAC flights are direct (91%), largely due to the well-connected route networks within countries. In contrast, only 20% of intercontinental travel from APAC is direct. This could be due to the relative lack of availability of direct flights to traveler destinations.


China and Japan rail insights

Rail travel is a popular choice for domestic business travel in China and Japan. Unlike air travel, which requires lengthy check-in and security processes, rail travel offers quicker boarding and deboarding, significantly reducing overall travel time especially for distances up to 1,200 km.

Train stations in both countries are typically located in city centers or business districts, providing easy access to key areas. Train tickets can also be more economical compared to airfares, especially when considering hidden costs such as transportation to and from airports and baggage fees.

The China Railway High-speed system, including the renowned Beijing-Shanghai line, offers extensive coverage and high speeds, greatly reducing travel times between major economic hubs. Our data shows that a second-class rail ticket can be up to 50% cheaper than economy class airfare, while a first-class rail ticket can be 10%-20% cheaper. However, a business class seat on the train can cost more than an economy or even premium economy airfare.

In Japan, there's a long-standing cultural preference for rail travel, deeply rooted in the country's history and infrastructure development. The Shinkansen, or "bullet train," is famous for its punctuality, speed and reliability, connecting major cities like Tokyo, Osaka and Kyoto with rapid transit times. According to BCD data, 50% of all domestic travel is conducted by rail due to its high frequency, lower fares and ease of travel.





Sustainability has become a top corporate priority, with travel buyers increasingly aware of business travel's environmental impact. Chinese companies lead in sustainability, favoring high-speed rail over air travel for its cost-effectiveness, efficiency, and convenience, especially for distances between 800-1,200 km. As the rail network expands, it's becoming more competitive with air travel.
